MINUTES MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES WESTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY MAY 4, 1989

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Craig Cole called the regular meeting of the Board to order at 1:30 p.m.

Asia University Presentation

Professor Norio Chiba of Asia University greeted the Board of Trustees and presented each with the <u>Pictorial Encyclopedia of</u> <u>Modern Japan</u>, by Gakken. Professor Chiba stated that 147 students from Asia University are enjoying their studies at Western spring quarter.

1. <u>APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES</u>

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees of Western Washington University, held April 6, 1989, were approved as submitted.

2. BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

Award of Vending Machine Contract

MOTION James Waldo moved, seconded by Martha Choe, that the 5-1-89 Board of Trustees of Western Washington University, upon recommendation of the President, award the contract for food and cigarette vending services for the entire campus to Canteen Services, Inc., of Seattle, Washington, effective July 1, 1989, and extending to June 30, 1992, and renewable year-to-year for two years at the university's option.

The motion passed. Larry Taylor abstained.

3. ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

a. <u>Report on Fairhaven Dean Search</u>

Vice President Sam Kelly gave a progress report on the Fairhaven Dean search, informing the Board that the finalists will visit campus during the month of May. A new dean should be in place before the beginning of fall quarter.

b. <u>Enrollment Management Report</u>

Vice President Kelly stated that as of May 1, 1989, Western has offered admittance to 3,000 freshmen, which will generate an entering class of 1,400 freshmen. Dr. Kelly discussed Western's Enrollment Management Plan and stated that one goal is to even out enrollment during fall, winter and spring quarters.

4. <u>STUDENT AFFAIRS</u>

- a. <u>WAC Chapter 516-28 (new) Standards and Procedures for</u> <u>Involuntary Administrative Withdrawal of Students at Western</u> <u>Washington University for Behavior from Mental Disorders</u>
- MOTION James Waldo moved, seconded by Martha Choe, that the 5-2-89 Board of Trustees of Western Washington University approve the recommended procedures for suspension of students demonstrating behavior indicating mental disorders which causes such students to present a serious threat of harm to themselves or others. The motion passed unanimously.

Chair Cole asked the Administration to report on the regulation at the August, 1989 meeting.

- b. <u>WAC Chapter 516-22 (amended) Student Rights and</u> <u>Responsibilities Code</u>
- MOTION James Waldo moved, seconded by Martha Choe, that the 5-3-89 Board of Trustees of Western Washington University approve WAC 516-22, Student Rights and Responsibilities Code, as amended by the Student Rights and Responsibilities Subcommittee. (See Attachment II)

The motion passed unanimously.

c. <u>Report on Family Weekend</u>

Vice President Saundra Taylor reported that between 600-800 family members were on campus for Western Showtime! Family Weekend, a day long series of activities held April 8, included co-curricular events which showcased student talents, skills and accomplishments outside of the classroom. Open to visitors were the Center for Fitness Evaluation, several computer, science and technology labs, the Substance Abuse Prevention Center, the Stress Management/Biofeedback Lab, A.S. Human Resources and Club Sports. A new highlight was a minority student reception held in the Western Gallery and attended by more than 100 minority students and family members.

d. <u>Report on Campus Life - S.M.A.R.T. Program</u>

Dr. Taylor introduced the newly hired Project Coordinator of the S.M.A.R.T. Program, Mr. Terry Pickeral, to the Board of Trustees. Mr. Pickeral was the Dean, Northwest Region, for Chapman College until February, 1989. He has had a wide range of experiences in working with special student populations.

Mr. Pickeral briefly outlined the S.M.A.R.T. project for Summer 1989. There will be 55 students, 75 percent of whom will be minority. They will be 14 and 15 year old "at-risk" adolescents from low-income families.

The program seeks to help students graduate from high school and provide them with an array of options which exist for high school graduates. The students will stay at Western for eight weeks during summer session. The program focuses on daily academic skill enhancement and work experience, personal development, community service, and self-motivation.

5. <u>EXTERNAL AFFAIRS</u>

a. <u>Summer Session Fees</u>

MOTION Larry Taylor moved, seconded by James Waldo, that the 5-4-89 Board of Trustees of Western Washington University, upon the recommendation of the President, establish the tuition schedule for Summer Quarter, 1989, as submitted.

President Mortimer reported that four final candidates for Vice President for Business and Finance have been announced and will be interviewed on campus during May.

9. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Chair Cole announced that Trustee Gordon Sandison, who has served on the Board for the past seven years, has been hospitalized for the past several weeks.
