Presents Baritone

Baritone, Mr. Roald Reitan will be presented in concert Monday, August 14, 8:15 p.m., in the College Auditorium.

Roald Reitan was born and raised in Tacoma, Washington. He attended public school as weil as the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma. It was while at UPS that Roald began his vocal studies under the direction of Ivan Rasmussen, now at Stanford University, and upon completion of his bachelor's degree, he went to New York City, where he received his master's degree in fine arts.

After he served in the United States Army, Roald continued his education at Stanford, where he again studied under the guidance of Ivan Rasmussen. It was while in the Bay area that he auditioned for and received a contract with the San Francisco Opera Company, to appear in the American premiers of "The Dialogue of the Carmelites" by Poulenc.

As a result of another audition Roald was selected as one of the twenty regional finalists of the American Opera Auditions Inc., to receive intensive training in Cincinnati, Ohio. After the two month period he was chosen, along wth seven others, to represent the United States in opera debut performances in Milan and Florence, Italy.

In January of 1959, Mr. Reitan entered the Metropolitan Opera auditions on the local level (Seattle, Washington) and was selected to represent the Pacific Northwest in the National auditions held in the Metropolitan Opera House, March 2, 1959. Reitan was announced cowinner and received a contract. He made his debut in the fall of 1959. Now in his second season, Mr. Reitan has appeared in over a dozen different operas.

Puppet Demonstration

Mr. Gerald Leet, visiting professor from England, will give a lecture-demonstration on puppetry in the Campus School Auditorium tonight at 8:15 p.m.

He will accompany his lecture with a sampling of his large collection of puppets acquired throughout his world travels. He will also show photographs on various aspects of puppet construction.

The noted English puppeteer has conducted a class on puppetry during this summer session, and gave a lecture earlier this quarter on "Folk Art and Drama." He is an Associate of the Royal College of Arts, and serves as a lecturer at the London Institute of Education. Mr. Leet has been associated with broadcasting for schools in both television and radio, and has done considerable work in the study of art for the treatment of nervous diseases.

He worked for the San Diego Union for two years, spent a year on the staff of the Edmonds Tribune-Review and worked with the Seattle Times while attending graduate school. For the past year he was on the faculty of Casper College, Casper, Wyoming. The work he did at Casper was similar to his duties at Western - teaching courses in journalism, advising student publications and handling the public information program of the college.




