Paul Ford has sight-fished Rocky Ford Creek in Grant, Washington for thirty years using #14 scuds and 3x tippets and caught some twenty-plus inch rainbows. But a December 22, 2017 piece in the Wenatchee World put him to shame because it cited a brief from the *Spokane Spokesman Review* stating that an angler named Don Childress from Sandpoint, Idaho caught and released, earlier in the month, a thirty-inch fish from the same stream. Aside from the fish's unheard of size was the "whimpy" fly rod Don said he was using and guess what—a #20 scud and 5x tippet. Magic!
