After discussion it was ordered that settlement of the matter be left in the hands of Mr. Beerwester . dean of summer

school, and the principal.

Upon request of the Board of Trustees the principal presented the appended schedule of teachers and employees for reelection at the salaries listed, with the exception of himself, his salary teing left at the figure in effect at the present time, viz. \$3750.00.

to The Registrar was directed to notify the teachers that the conditions of service, as now existing, viz., those adopted by Normal schools of the state a year ago and ratified by the Board of Trustees of this institution, will prevail the coming year:

1. That the school year shall begin on the first Tuesday in September and close about the first of the following June;
that the summer session shall begin on the Monday following the
annual commencement and close not later than the first of the
following August.

2. That the annual salary of each teacher shall be di-

vided into twelve equal monthly payments.

3. That the salary of any teacher shall not be paid for the months of June and July when such teacher is excused from teaching in summer school by the Board of Trustees.

4. That each member of the faculty shall, without preindice, be entitled to be excused from work in summer session each alternate year.

First: For the post two years, the Training Department of the Hormal School has been very much crowded, and an appropriation of \$31,000,00 we made by the last Legislature for the erection and equipment of an addition to the Training School building. In order that there might be as little delay as possible in setting the construction of this addition under way, an exchitect was employed early in April to prepare plane and specifications for the These were propaged by Mr. Los, and are ready for the m of this Board. If the plane and specifications meet consideration of this Board. with the approval of the Board, hide for the construction of this building may be called for now at any time. Since this building eved as on addition to the present Emining School is to be ore building, it is especially desirable that as much of the construc-tion work be completed during vacation as peoplike in order that the work of the contractors may not interfere seriously with the rogalar school work next September. For this recept we recommend that bids be called for sud a contract for the exection of the building be made as poon as possible, in order that the building may be ready for use during the coming school year.

Second: The addition of the new building to our present plant will name it measurer for the Board of Trustees to consider the pempeling of the heating plant, for the present system of believe

It is recommended, therefore, that the Exustees appoint s special committee to investigate enrufully the whole problem of hosting and ventilation, with a view of making such changes as may be found necessary in connection with the exection of the buildings

Third: For the past fourboan years, the institution has used road amplusively for fuel, but as the plant has increased in sise, it has been mesossary to purchase a greater contity of mood, until at present it requires about mix hundred cords of 4-foot wood. commally to operate the hosting plant. Owing to the had roads in the winter, it is advisable to continue to here all of this fuel delivered in the summer time, and it takes about an agre of valuable ground to previde room enough for the storage of the fuel for the This great pile of wood is objectionable, first, institution from the standpoint of appearance; second, because it necessitates a constant extra expense in the way of employment of help to wheel the wood into the boiler room; and, third, it deprives the children of the fraining School of a large stretch of course which is needed

as a play ground.
It is thegefore resommended that the Board of Trustees look earofully into the advisability of the adoption of erade oil as a fuel for the institution. We are informed that reliable compenies stand ready to enter into a contract to furnish oil for fael

for a period of years under a graduated scale of prices.

Fourth:--The last Logislature appropriated the sum of \$136,060.00 for calaries for the present biennial period, which makes available about \$66,000.00 per year. It will be unconcary to use about \$61,000,00 of this enound toward paying the salaries of the tonshare and other employees who were re-classed on they 5th by the Trustees for the coming school year. This leaves about \$7,000,00 available for the employment of new tonobers.

We wish to resommend strongly that a thoroughly practical school man be employed to take charge of a rural school department in the institution, to begin work next September. In this com-meetion, we wish to suggest that practically all teachers have already been employed throughout the state for the centus year, and if we hope to secure a good strong man for this position, we should take action in this matter in the very near future. setion is taken. I believe we could scours the services of County Superintendent T. E. Hulse, of Bromeyton. He has already been en-gaged to take charge of rural school work during the summer session. If prompt Our institution has for four years been doing some work for rural school teachers, but the time has some when a separate department should be established for this work and a teacher amployed to give his entire time to this department...

It will also be necessary to employ an additional Critic Teacher for the coming year, and an assistant teacher for the departments of Oral Expression and Vocal Maic.
