



The Third British Empire developed after the World War. The tactics of the former empires were changed and revised and an entirely new policy was developed towards the colonies. Instead of being the United Kingdom, the empire became the British Commonwealth of Nations, each of which was self-governing and representative in the supreme council.

Taught by Revolution Britain's change of policy towards her colonies was greatly influenced by the American Revolution of 1776. From this rebellion, two lessons were taught the British: (1) concession before surrender; and (2) for this year. cessation to attempt to force tax-

Professor Soward assured his audience that it was not the aim of the British Empire to standardize the peoples of the world, but rather to enable them to establish finer
