One half of the students are from Whatcom county.

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

Husky Trainees Are Powerful; Lappenbusch to Shoot Works

With an upset in the offing, the WWC Vikings travel to Seattle tomorrow night to meet the University of Washington Huskies in a return game between the two teams. Washington won the first game, played here last month, by a score of 66 to 41.

While the Viks have been improving with each game, the Huskies have been knocked from the lofty perch they held three weeks ago. After their disastrous Oregon trip, in which the Husky five lost four straight, they dropped from first place to a tie with Washington State for fourth. Since Washington's civilian cagers are across the mountains playing WSC and Idaho. the Vikings will meet the same Trainee five that played here instead of the combined squads. Even at that the Husky trainees are a very potent aggregation with veterans Don McMillan and Dick Vandenburgh still on the firing line. McMillan scored 20 points and Vandenburgh 15 against Oregon last week, and both are rugged backboard retrievers.

Meanwhile, Coach Lappenbusch has had his charges hard at work to keep them in a scoring mood. In running up a 70-57 win last Saturday night over Sand Point, the Vikings went on their greatest shooting spree of the season. If the Viks can stay in a scoring mood the Huskies will have a busy evening, as it was inconsistency from the field that cost the Blue and White victory the last game. Winners in three out of their last four games the Vikings will not be going down just for the ride.
