Two weeks ago on October 28 and 29 the debate team went to CPS for a similar practice. There are no awards for these tournaments but they are useful for practice.

The Forensic club was organized two years ago and last spring became affiliated with Phi Kappa Delta, a national forensic organization.

Last year at the Washington State Tyro tournament Western took two cups, two second places and two third places. This year there are twenty-five members in the Forensic club.

Pre-Quarter Registration Date Made

Crusade For Freedom Drive Begins on Campus Tuesday

Every person on Western's campus will be given an opportunity next week to enlist in the Crusade for Freedom and contribute to the support of Radio Free Europe.

Inaugurated in 1950 and symbolized by the massive World Freedom bell, the Crusade carries the message of democracy to the people on the Soviet side of the iron curtain. Radio Free Europe is an independent radio station, supported entirely by voluntary

contributions from American citizens.

Prof. Ruth Platt is college chairman of the crusade, with student members Marian Stefani, Paul Gillie, and Charles Odell. Members of Valkyrie and the International Relation/club are assisting.

The 1951 goal includes the erection of two more powerful transmitters in Europe and the establishment of a freedom-station in Asia to stop the spread of communism in the Far East.

Bob Baklund, general chairman for the dance, has arranged for records and decorations. In connection with Education week the theme of the dance will be school days.

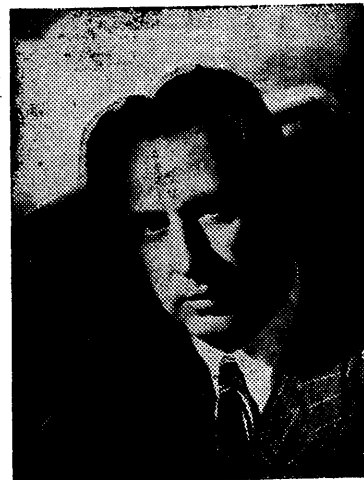
Phyllis Mason is in charge of reception and Neil Jeremiah is arranging for the chaperons.

Air Advocate To Lecture On Survival

Major Alexander de Seversky, author of "Air Power: Key to Survival," will speak in the November 13 program of the Artist and Lecture series, to be held in the new auditorium at 10 a. m.

Major de Seversky believes that America can maintain peace, or achieve victory in war, only by development of invincible air power. His first book, "Victory Through Air Power" was written during World War II to convince the public of that fact. He feels that the United States again faces a similar crisis.

After serving as a naval aviator in his native Russia, Major de Sev-

ersky came to the United States. He became a consulting engineer and test pilot. After receiving citizenship papers, he was commissioned a major in the Air Corps Reserve. Later, he established his own aircraft corporation, where he designed and built the world's fastest amphibian plane, and many other outstanding aircraft models.

Major de Seversky has received the Medal of Merit and the Harmon trophy for his "contributions to final victory." He has lectured in many military war colleges and in diplomatic circles in Chile, Argentina, and Uruguay.

Fitting Tribute to Fighting Men Seen in Education

This task is not a simple task. Moral values of recent generations have been shaken by two world wars, and the subordination of ideals to the material achievements of an atomic age.

While teaching moral values holds a high priority on the claims of the teacher, educators cannot teach moral values alone. These values develop out of the total pattern of our experiences. Government, business, schools, churches, welfare agencies, and the family must all promote the ideals which the experiences of past generations have shown to be guide posts to human happiness.

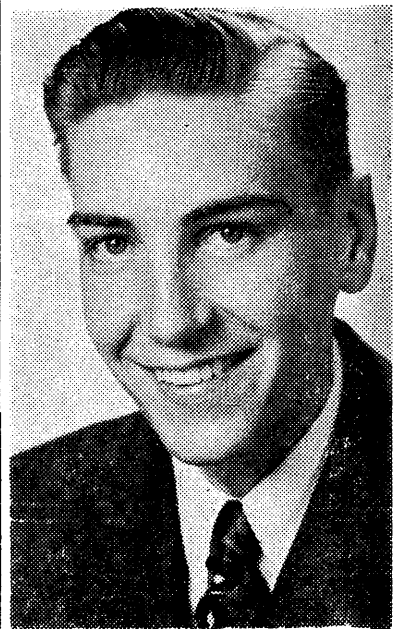
Tickets for the dance will be on sale in the main hall, beginning Tuesday, November 13. The price will be \$1.25 per couple.

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Hash Possible Shrine Choice

Vik Top Ground Gainer May Play in Frisco

Western Washington has a nominee for the annual East-West football game played in San Francisco in the person of Norm Hash, the Viking's chief ground gainer and leading scorer for Western. Opponents remark that Hash is the hardest charging back and one of the stoutest plungers in the league. His freshman year at Western, 1948, saw him gain Honorable Mention All Conference, second team, United Press All Star Northwest and was voted best bucking halfback in the Evergreen conference.

He kept up the good work in his sophomore year attaining Honorable Mention Little All-American, Honorable Mention All Coast, Honorable Mention Little All-Coast, first team All Pacific Northwest, and Honorable Mention All-Conference. In the Pacific University game that year he made 79 yards in 12 tries. He was named on virtually every small college All-star team on the Pacific coast. His junior year was just as illustrious as his two preceding years.

Named on the first team All-Conference, and Honorable Mention United Press Little All-Coast, Hash's ground gaining record was 7 yards a try and this was half way through the '49 season. In the PLC game that year he scored three times and made 91 yards.

His senior year is just as brilliant as the former three. He scored three times in the UBC game and made 112 yards; the Whitworth game saw Norm score three touchdowns and make 170 yards in 23 tries, better than 7 yards per try. He has carried the ball 91 times in eight games for a total of 538 yards and an average of 5.65 yards. In eight games he has scored 78 points.

Norm stands 5 feet 9 inches and weighs 200 pounds. His home town is Enumclaw.

Vikings Crush Pirates 51-12

Norm Hash, Western "little All-American fullback candidate," bulled his way to three touchdowns and 169 yards to lead the Western Washington college Vikings to a 51-12 Homecoming victory over the Whitworth Pirates in Bellingham last Saturday.

Hash led the Western ground offense, which gained 305 yards, with 23 attempts for a net of 169 yards. Teammate Don Wally aided the total offensive figures by netting 113 yards through passing and rushing.

Aiding the victory was the hard

play of the big "D" team which held Whitworth to a minis 50 yards rushing and 151 yards passing for a net gain of 93 yards. Backs Rufus Winters, Eldon Odle and Al Cornet intercepted three Whit passes to deliver the ball to the offensive unit in scoring territory. Hardcharging linemen Buck Burger and Eaton picked off two Pirate fumbles.
