## Complete Text of Proposed_Revision of Associated Student Body Constitution

Article I. PURPOSE. The purpose of this association is to provide for the promotion and regulation of all matters of general student concern at Western Washington College of Education.
Article II. NAME. The name of this association shall be "Associated Students of the Western Washington College of Education."

Article III. MEMBERSHIP. AII registered students of the Western Washington College of Education who have paid the student activity fee shall become members of this association for the period covered by the fee.

Article IV. OFFICERS:
Section 1. The officers of the association shall be a president, a vice president, and members of the Board of Control.

Section 2. The governing board of this association shall be: known as the Board of Control, and shall be composed of fifteen (15) members; three (3) faculty representatives, the Associated Students president, and vice president, and ten (10) student representatives.

Section 3. Each year at the third regular meeting of the fall quarter, the Interclub Council shall submit the names of five faculty members to the President of the College, who in conjunction with the President of the Associated Students shall choose one to serve on the Board of Control for three years beginning winter quarter.

Article V. DUTIES OF OFFICERS:

Section 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the student body, shall preside over the Board of Control, shall appoint committee chairmen, and shall be considered as a member of these committees.

Section 2. The vice president shall discharge the duties of the president in case of the latter's absence, resignation, or forfeiture of office. He shall attend Board of Control meetings, shall have charge of all arrangements for elections, and shall be the representative of the Board of Control on the Interclub Council.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall have general supervision of all business affairs, property, and activities of this association; it shall have the power to appoint, hire, and discharge any employees, appointees, or student managers.

Section 4. The Board of Control shall, with the approval of the School Administration, establish membership fees and formulate budgets. All financial transactions of the association must have the approval of the Board of Control.

The Board of Control shall have charge of the association's activities, shall grant all awards, and shall determine admission fees to association events.
Article VI. NOMINATION OF OFFICERS:
Section 1. Prospective candidates for office shall file with the President of Interclub Council no later than the fifth week of each quarter.

Section 2. The eligibility of such applicants shall be certified by the president of Interclub Council who shall submit the acceptible names to the election chairman.
Article VII. ELIGIBILITY OF OFFICERS:
Section 1. To be eligible for office, the candidate shall have at least a 2.3 accumulative grade point average.
carrying twelve credit hours at the time of election and must maintain this twelve credit hour load during his term of office.
To be eligible for election as president or vice president, a student must have had at least six quarter of resident work at the Western Washington College of Education; to be eligible for election as representative on the Board of Control students must have had at least two quarters resident work at the Western Washington College of Education.
,Article VIII. ELECTION OF OFFICERS:
Section 1. Names of all certified candidates shall be placed on the ballot to be voted upon in a primary election to be held on two successive days of the sixth week of each quarter.
Section 2. The three candidates for each position receiving the greatest number of votes shall have their names placed on the ballot for the general election which shall be held on two successive days of the eighth week of each quarter.
Section 3. The candidate for each position reeciving a plurality is elected.
Section 4. In case of a tie vote the choice shall be made by lot under supervision of the election board.
Section 5. The president and vice president shall be chosen by a secret ballot of the members of the association at an election to be held in the seventh week of the winter quarter, and shall hold office for one year from the date of taking office, or until their successors are duly elected and qualified.
Section 6. The president-elect and vice president-elect shall become ex-officio members of the Board of Control spring quarter and shall take office the following fall quarter. All other officers shall take office at the first regular meet ing of the Board of Control following election.
Article IX. VACANCIES:
Section 1. Vacancies on the Board of Control may be filled by appointment or election at the dis cretion of the Board.
Section 2. In the case of the vacancy in the office of the president the vice president shall become the president pro-tem; the president of Interclub Council shall temporarily assume the duties of the vice president. Upon the election of a new president, the former vice president shall serve for the unexpired term to which he was elected.
Section 3. The president of the Western Washington College of Education shall fill any vacancy in the offices of faculty representative appointed by him.
Article X. FEES:
Section 1. During the first week in May, the president of the asso ciation shall arrange a joint meeting of the Board of Control shall submit for consideration and approval the general budget for the ensuing year. At this meeting the Associated Students' membership fee for the ensuing year shall be determined, which when approved by the Board of Trustees of the Western Washington College of Education shall be published in the annual catalog of the school as an official school fee. Such fees shall be for the benefit of the associated student body.
Section 2. The fees provided for

Washington College of Education in such manner as provided by the Board of Conrol and officers of the college.
Section 3. Refunds shall be allowed only in cases of withdrawal from the Western Washington College of Education. If a student withdraws from school during the first week of the quarter, all fees shall be refunded.
If a student withdraws during the second week, 80 percent of the fees shall be refunded.
No fees shall be refunded when a student withdraws after the second week.
Section 4. Payment of fees shall entitle a student to membership in this association, a subscription to the Western Washington Collegian, and a free or reduced admission to such entertainments and other events sponsored by the association and designated by the Board of Control.

## Article XI. MEETINGS:

Section 1. Regular meetings of the association shall be held at reguar school assembly periods at any time during the school year upon the call of the president, or in case of refusal or inability to issue the necessary call, upon written request of ten (10) percent of the members of the association, such requests having been posted on the official bulletin at least ten (10) school days previous to the time of the proposed meeting.
Section 2. Fifty (50) percent of the total membership of the association shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
Section 3. The Board of Control shall hold weekly meetings during the academic year. The time of such mecting shall be uniform throughout the quarter. With due notification special meetings of the Board of Control may be called by the president or six members of the Board of Control.
Article XII. REMOVAL OF OFFICERS OR REPRESENTATIVES. The Board of Control shall provide for a recall election of any officer or representative on the Board of Control elected by the association whenever petitioned by ten (10) percent of the number voting at the last presidential election. Such officers or representatives may be removed from office by a majority of the members voting. Such voting shall be by secret ballot.

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## REFERENDUM

Section 1. Legislative authority is vested in the Board of Control, but the members of the association shall have the power within the jurisdiction of the association to propose any bill or measure passed by the Board of Control.
Section 2. The Board of Control shall provide for an initiative election when ever petitioned by ten (10) percent of the members of the association, provided that the petition shall contain not less than one hundred signatures; and the Board of Control shall also provide for a referendum election whenever a petition presented therefore shall con
tain ten (10) percent of the mem bers of the association, or not less than one hundred signatures.
Article XIV. AMENDMENTS:
Section 1. Amendments to this constitution shall be presented to the members of the association by a majority vote of the members of
the Board of Control, or by peti-
tion containing the signatures of
bers (10) percent or the mem bers of the association posed amendments shall be placed upon the ballot for the next general election.
Section 2. This constitution shall be amended by a two-thirds vote. Article XV. SUMMER QUARTER:
Section 1. During the fifth week of spring quarter, the Board of Control shall call for applications from students desiring to serve on the Board of Control during the summer quarter. The Board of Control shall select some of their members from these applications.
Section 2. At the first regular meeting of the summer quarter, the Board shall elect a presiding officer.
